What: Any patient-oriented research project, completed in whole or in part. The Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) definition of Patient-Oriented Research can be summarized with four key points.

Health research that:

- engages patients as partners (not just study subjects);
- focuses on patient-important outcomes and patient-identified priorities;
- aims to improve health outcomes, experience of care, sustainability of the healthcare system, or practical research;
- is conducted in multidisciplinary teams with relevant stakeholders (involving knowledge users in the research project).

POR has commonality with community-based research (CBR) and participatory action research (PAR). For the purpose of this poster session, both CBR and PAR projects will be considered.

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Abstract Adjudication Process

Adjudication will be completed by a team comprised of the BC SUPPORT Unit's four stakeholder groups: patients, healthcare providers, researchers and decision-makers.

Selection Criteria

Each abstract will be adjudicated on:

- Patient-oriented research: the project exemplifies patient-oriented research as defined by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR).
- Significance: relevance of the problem and/or implications for clinical practice, patient care, or health care system.
- Coherence: demonstrates good understanding of the problem; inclusion of relevant literature; logical link between problem, goals, and research questions.
- Appropriateness of Methods: adequacy in research design, sample/sampling, data collection and instruments, data analysis, and feasibility.
- Knowledge translation: an appropriate knowledge translation plan is included.
